Bursaries

Public Transport

The nearest station to the Jubilee Conference Centre is Nottingham station, 2 miles away. There are over 30 direct train services between London St Pancras and Nottingham daily and trains also run from other major cities. From Nottingham station Google shows three possibilities:

1. Tram to the Queens Medical Centre; the Conference Centre is then a 13 minute walk
2. Number 3 bus from Stop S6 to Beastmarket; 1-minute walk to Friar Lane stop F3, bus to Hillside stop LE12, a 6-minute walk from the Conference Centre
3. Walk to Collin St stop C3, take number 34 bus to Hillside stop LE12, a 6-minute walk from the Conference Centre
