It does this through the publication of its biannual journal *The Agricultural History Review*, and its newsletter, *Rural History Today*, and by holding at least two conferences each year. These activities are contained in the Society's constitution adopted at its foundation in 1953, and subsequently modified at the Society's Annual General Meetings in 2000 and 2016.

Report on Activities during the Financial Year

Publishing

This continues to be the principal means by which the Society fulfils its objectives. The Society published two issues of *The Agricultural History Review*, Volume 66 (2018) in June and December. Back numbers of the Review are freely available to all via the website, three years in arrears: the website currently has copies up to 2016 (vol 64). The Society also published two issues of the newsletter *Rural History Today* (nos 35 and 36), which is widely distributed beyond the membership of the Society, and is freely available to all on the BAHS website. The website also, amongst other things, hosts LIBRAL (Library of Irish and British Rural and Agricultural Literature), which provides direct free access to digitised literature on the subject.

Grants

The Society offers grants to individuals, societies and institutions in the furtherance of its objects. During the year £2025 grants and bursaries were taken up, including bursaries to our two conferences, a contribution to an Environment History Workshop and sponsorship of a Leuven 2017 event. In addition, a prize award of £500 was made from the Joan Thirsk Fund

The society also supports EURHO (The European Rural History Organisation) with a grant/subscription: and is a member of the British Association for Local History.

Conferences

The Annual Conference was held at Bridgewater & Taunton College, Somerset, in March 2018 and the Winter Conference at the Senate House, University of London in December 2018.

Membership

Subscription for the forthcoming year was increased to £30 for individual or joint members, and £42 for individual or joint members overseas. There is a concessionary rate of £15 for students. The annual subscription for Libraries and other Institutions is now £120. Most new members continue to join through the website, paying by PayPal. Electronic access to the *Review* via Ingenta is provided free for individual members and institutional subscribers.

Accounts for the Year to 31 January 2019

The Society made a deficit of £4770 compared with a deficit of £1702 in 2017 and a surplus of £11890 in 2016. The current year deficit was wholly attributable to unrealised losses in the value of our investments, which largely happened in the final quarter of the year, in part driven by Brexit concerns in the markets. Discounting unrealised losses/gains on investments, the current year showed an excess of income over expenditure of £845, compared to an in-year deficit of £6860 in the previous year, and an in-year surplus of £8093 in 2016. Income from subscriptions and journal sales held up at £29,632, compared with £30,382 the previous year (the impact of the subscription increase not really being felt yet), while our two conferences both made small surpluses this year, compared with deficits the previous year. Publication costs were broadly similar, and the main year-on-year difference in expenditure was a reduction in spend on Libral.

During the year we sold off our National Savings Bonds and purchased a St James Place Unit Trust, with the aim of boosting our investment income. In all we have some £118,264 of cash and investments at current values (£125,638 in 2017-18). We make and report notional (unrealised) gains and losses on these investments year by year, but the intention is to hold the investments for the long term.

The Joan Thirsk Fund again made a prize award of £500, reducing the balance to £870.

Reserves Policy

The Society's policy is, taking one year with the next, to spend the income it receives in pursuit of its objectives, while setting aside any surpluses to cover future projects, and to generate future income to support the society's grants and awards. The Society has no Restricted Funds. Its Unrestricted Funds currently stand at £108,319 out of which two Designated Funds have been set aside by the Trustees, as follows

Designated Projects and Initiatives Fund, currently standing at £21,672 (invested in COIF). This is set aside to pay for new and continuing activities which cannot readily be funded from in-year revenue. Expenditure from this fund is at the discretion of the Trustees, but in particular is expected to provide for the future development of the website, and the Libral digitisation project.

Research and Grants Fund, currently standing at £45,622 (invested in CAF and St James Place). This is intended to be an investment fund, the income from which (£862 in the current year) will be used for the provision of grants and donations to support new research, and events such as conferences, awards and publications in the Society's area of agricultural and rural history.

The **Unrestricted, Undesignated** balance of our reserves stands at £41,025, equivalent to approximately a year's current expenditure. It is the intention of the Trustees to aim to maintain this fund at a level sufficient to cover seasonal and unexpected fluctuations between income and expenditure, without having to sell any of our investments, which might incur significant losses..
